


5 Reasons Garden Tubs Are the Most *Wasteful* Part of Your Home



Garden tubs waste more than just space. See what your master bathroom can become with an easy garden tub removal.



Garden tubs used to be considered a luxury for their deep soaking space, hydrotherapy jets, and elaborate tile surrounds. Today, these features no longer fit with homeowners' needs or style preferences. And as it turns out, garden tubs are incredibly wasteful.

From wasted space to wasted money, there are five main reasons that garden tubs are no longer beneficial to have in the home. (These also happen to be the top reasons we remove and replace garden tubs every day!)

If you're dealing with one or more of these five issues, you're in luck. The following pages show some of the **most popular floorplan changes you can achieve by replacing your garden tub** with a bathing space that works better for you and your family.

PROBLEM 1


Wasted Space

An oversized soaking tub surrounded by bulky framing and tile gives the *appearance* of a luxurious built-in bath, but it's actually costing you valuable floor space.


Compared to a standard bathtub that measures 15 square feet, a corner garden tub can take up as much as 25 square feet of your bathroom! According to a recent survey from YouGov, that extra 10 square feet of space is dedicated to a bathroom fixture that's used just once a week or less.

What a waste!

Replacing your garden tub with a walk-in shower – or removing it altogether – creates great opportunities to gain square footage within your existing bathroom without the expense and mess of changing the bathroom footprint.


PROBLEM 2

Excess Water Use

Their large size puts garden tubs at a second disadvantage: they use *considerably* more water than necessary for bathing.

Compared to an average 65 gallon capacity for a standard bathtub, corner garden tubs can hold 85, 96, or sometimes more than 100 gallons of water! Meanwhile, a 10-minute shower with a standard 2.5 gallon-per-minute showerhead will give you plenty of time to get perfectly clean using just 25 gallons of water.

LET'S DO SOME BATH MATH:




For every 4 soaks you take in a garden tub, the same amount of water could be used for 5 soaks in a standard tub – or 13 showers.



An average garden tubs holds about 20% more water than an average standard tub.



A 10-minute shower uses about 60% less water than a standard tub, and 70% less than a garden tub.



Difficult to Get In & Out Of

As homeowners plan to live in their homes longer, we receive frequent requests to update bathrooms for both style *and* safety. In these cases, garden tubs are among the first fixtures to be cut from bathroom layouts.

Because of their size, garden tubs are more like small swimming pools than bathtubs. And while some designs have steps or seats built into their surrounds, garden tubs (unlike swimming pools) almost *never* have handrails or grab bars to provide safe balancing while getting in and out of the tub.

Bathroom slip-and-falls cause 78,000 injuries in the U.S. every year, contributing to bathrooms ranking as the second most dangerous room in the house (behind kitchens).

With this in mind, garden tubs are not a good choice for safe bathroom designs. A well-designed walk-in shower, or a walk-in tub, are much better solutions when safety is a priority.

PROBLEM 4

Difficult to Clean

Challenges getting in and out of the tub extend to cleaning these bathroom behemoths, which may require even more attention if they're outfitted with jets.

Effectively cleaning a garden tub means awkwardly reaching over the bulky surround (and sometimes climbing in!) to reach all areas of the tub. In order to clean jetted tubs, the tub must be filled high enough to submerge the jets so a cleaning solution can be added to the water and run through the internal tubing. If you skip this step, you'll end up with flakes of moldy sediment flushed into your tub next time you want to take a bath. *Gross!*

Not only is all of this inconvenient and difficult, but filling the tub halfway just to clean it is even more wasted water to account for. What a pain! Garden tubs definitely don't have an "easy clean" factor like standard tubs and walk-in showers do.





Outdated Style

Garden tubs were once viewed as luxury amenities because of how substantial they appeared. The built-in designs, elaborate surrounds, jets, and other features had an air of indulgence that many homeowners desired, especially in the 1980s and 90s.

Of course, times change, design styles go with them, and the time for garden tubs has passed.

Today's aesthetic focuses much more on minimalist designs and clean lines without being stark or plain. The result is bathrooms that are comfortable, functional, and – most importantly – *timeless*.









What Could You Do with Extra Space in Your Bathroom?

Garden tubs have a lot working against them and, as we frequently hear from homeowners, not enough advantages to make them worth keeping. Many of our customers tell us their unused garden tubs are now just where they keep dirty laundry baskets and bulk toilet paper packages. That's definitely not the intended use of that space!

2. A BETTER BATH OR SHOWER




3. LINEN CLOSET
